Pay as you play — ECA Payment explained in full

BBIS students returned from their two month holiday to find they would have to pay for participation in certain sports. Popular sports such as basketball, volleyball and football are to cost €50 merely to train with the team.

BBIS has a strong sports programme, has consecutively retained the title as GISST Champions since 2008, and plan on repeating it for the upcoming sports year.

Students were horrified and upset with the new policy, describing it as as 'unnecessary.' A member of the BBIS Varsity Football team agreed to speak to the newspaper about to the new policy. "The schools tuition fees are high enough as it is, we

high enough as it is, we shouldn't need to pay extra to play our sports." The student continued, "It is also very annoying for Continued on Page 2



people in the IB years. We are required to participate in sports in order to gain CAS hours, but suddenly we have to pay for them."

It was rumoured that the school was under pressure to cut back on costs, and this was a way of improving the schools finances.

Mr Joost Langendock, head of sports at BBIS, agreed to speak to The Buzz about the much hyped issue. "The general idea is that the school is trying to save cost, and that is the only reason behind it." Langendock dismissed any talk of such funding being used for a new project, confirming that it is simply to help the school financially.

The charging policy is intended to help to cover the costs of running the sports ECAs. It is the students that participate in the sport are the ones that contribute.

Langendock explained the reason behind setting up a separate fee that applies only to those that participate in the sports involved, "If it is included in the school fee, and you're not doing an activity, should you pay for the boys and girls playing football and going on a trip?" It would not make sense for parents to fund and pay for something their child has little or nothing to do with, which explains, and justifies, why the fee was

was not simply included in the tuition fee.

Langendock and his colleagues in the sports department were well aware of the fact that it would not be the most popular of decisions. Many predicted that fewer people would sign up for the sporting ECAs, a consideration which crossed Langendock's mind prior to introducing the policy. "People obviously won't be jumping up and down at the thought of having to pay for something."

However, he said there has been no fall in the numbers of students enrolled in the sports programmes. BBIS will still be able to field a team for every sport, and no sports have suffered to the point of having to disband it. With the new policy, one concern expressed is that students might feel afraid to try out new sports, as they do not want to waste their money.

On a more positive note, in previous years, the school and parents would work on a 50-50 basis to cover the costs of sports trips. With the new policy this has changed to 60-40, with the school paying 60% and the parents paying 40%, which was the school's effort to come to a compromise with the parents.

"Inspire a Generation" - A Review of the 2012 London Paralympics

The 2012 London Paralympic Games took place between the 29th of August and the 9th of September. With 164 nations participating, London had approximately 4294 athletes taking part in the Games this year. From the opening ceremony to the closing ceremony, the 2012 Paralympic Games lived it to its motto: Inspire a Generation.

The opening ceremony, inspired by William Shakespeare's "The Tempest" and themed around the notion of "Enlightenment", notably featured British physicist Stephen Hawing and the electronic music group Orbital.

The Olympic Torch was brought in the Olympic Stadium via zip line by Joe Townsend, a Marine who lost both legs after stepping on a landmine in Afghanistan and who plans to compete in the 2016 Paralympic Games in Rio de Janeiro. Townsend then passed it on to David Clarke, the long-time British Five-aside football captain who gave it to the lighter of the Olym-Dic Cauldron, Margaret Maughan, the winner of Britain's first gold medal at the first ever Paralympics in Rome.

During the eleven days of action, events in twenty different sports ranging from archery to wheelchair tennis were displayed. Over of 1,000 individuals medals were distributed, 290 Paralympics records were broken and 207 World Records Broken. Outstanding multiple medallists of the 2012 staging of the Paralympic Games are: the Australian swimmer Jacqueline Freney (8 gold medals), the Brazilian swimmer Daniel Dias (6 gold medals) and the American swimmer Jessica Long (5 gold medals, 2 silver medals and 1 bronze medal).

The closing ceremony held September 9th at the Olympic Stadium of London was described as a "festival of fire". British rock band Coldplay lead the ceremony, joined by Barbadian singer Rihanna and African - American rapper lay-Z.

About 1,000 performers, acrobats and dancers. both disabled and able-bodied. put on a spectacular show for millions of viewers throughout the world. Also attending the ceremony were proud British Prime Minister David Cameron course, the Royal family,

The passing of the Paralympic flag by the London Mayor, Boris Johnson to the Mayor of Rio De Janeiro Eduardo Paes and a rain of spectacular fireworks concluded what are being described as the "Greatest Olympics and Paralympics in history".

### Merkel's Magic

In the face of mounting skepticism over the survival of the Euro, Merkel has done it again. Germany's chancellor made a striking comeback in mid-September

Continued from page 3 by convincing the Federal Constitutional Court to pass her latest initiative aimed at quelling the Eurozone disaster. Her main objective is to fortify the European Stability Mechanism, a bailout fund that was created as an emergency measure in May of 2010. With the court ruling, Germany, as Europe's largest economy and a consistent buoy in maintaining the Euro above water, will be contributing further to the fund.

The payments will be used to purchase government bonds, or loans to the government, from struggling countries such as Italy or Spain. For now, a total of € 190 Billion will be invested into the fund, and any increases will have to be approved by parliament. Several prominent politicians, including Italy's Prime Minister Mario Monti and the German Foreign Minister Guido Westerwelle, applauded Merkel's actions as "excellent news", a statement that seemed to resonate with the stock market.

However, critics denounced the chancellor's decision as contradictory after she fervently opposed the purchasing of Eurobonds several months ago. The idea of a collective debt burden strikes some as a blow to taxpayers and only a short-term solution to the corrosive flaws that have been permeating Europe ever since the global recession of 2008.

According to the New York Times, Merkel is convinced that Germany holds a "responsibility in Europe as the largest economy", a statement Jörg Krämer, on the other hand, the Chief Economist at Commerzbank, interprets as a tragic "union of mutualized debt".

The only consensus that can be reached for the time being is that Merkel is sending out a clear message to German citizens and the rest of the world: sometimes, even leading economies have to acknowledge that we're all in this together.

Road to the US Elections: Obama Takes the Lead

With little over a month remaining until November 6th, Election Day in the U.S, Republican nominee Mitt Romney and Democratic nominee, President Barack Obama, are approaching the critical moments in their campaigns. After being nominated during the Republican (August 27th) and Democratic (September 3<sup>rd</sup>) National Conventions, they are now preparing for three televised debates on October 3rd, 16th, and 22<sup>nd</sup>. These debates will cover domestic and foreign policy issues, and each nominee will have two minutes to address the question asked, before responding to his opponent.

Presidential debates often have a large effect on the race, as the candidates will begin to show their opinions on topics, as opposed to the party's position. Voters are peager to see how the candidates respond under pressure, watch for mistakes, and further their understanding of the candidates' personalities.

President Obama has struggled to convince voters that he has upheld his promises from the historic 2008 election. Mitt Romney is criticized for being distant from the public, as he is wealthiest man to run for president.

The race has been extremely close thus far, with poll results on August 24th showing that 49% of those polled supported Barack Obama, and 47% supported Mitt Romney. These numbers had remained fairly stable for months; however, following the Democratic Convention support for Obama has increased. A poll taken on September 24th showed that 53% of likely voters supported Obama, while 46% supported Romney.

According to past voting patterns, and national public opinion polls, it is estimated that Barack Obama will win 332 electoral votes out of the 270 needed. Romney will win 191 votes. Although Romney is predicted to win a larger number of states than Obama, they are states with fewer electoral votes. York (29 electoral votes), which tend to be won by the democratic candidate.

Interview with Mr. Kotrc— TheNew Kid on the Block



Getting to know the "New Kid on the Block"— An interview with new Director Mr.Peter Kotrc on his goals for this year, personal life, thoughts on the IB program and much more.

In an exclusive interview The Buzz met with the new BBIS Director Mr.Peter Kotrc to discuss his goals for the upcoming school year, views on the IB Curriculum, amongst others.

The Buzz: Tell us a bit about your background. Where are you from? Where have you lived?

Mr.Kotrc: I was born in Vienna, Austria where I worked many years at the International School of Vienna, then moved on to the International School of The Hague in the Netherlands.

The Buzz: Do you have any interesting hobbies? What kind of music do you listen to?

Mr.Kotrc: I cycle to work every morning, (I am a citizen of Kleinmachnow!), I try to participate in at least 2 half Marathons a year, (when I was a bit younger I used to do at least 2 full Marathons a was a bit younger I used to do at least 2 full Marathons a year but as age progresses...laughs) I really enjoy classical music and the theatre, and for both there's lots of opportunities in the Potsdam and Berlin area.

The Buzz: What made you decide to apply for this position at BBIS?

Mr.Kotrc: The reputation of the school as a growing school, a good school, as the only school worldwide offering all 4 IB programs including the IBBCC program, and of course the boarding school, so I saw a lot of potential and thought this position could be a great opportunity.

The Buzz: What do you like about BBIS so far?

Mr.Kotrc: I like the welcoming climate that is visible throughout all three groups of the school, the students, parents and teachers.

The Buzz: What are some areas of improvement or changes you would like to focus on in the next few years?

Mr.Kotrc: I think there's some need to improve in the IT area, we definitely also need more class and room space which I am happy that in 2015 we'll be getting, which I think is important for an International School, however I am still in the process of finding out everything about the school.

The Buzz: What do you believe is most important for an International School?

Mr.Kotrc: Respect for the different nationalities and

and open-mindedness. Trying your best to learn from the cultural differences and getting the inter-cultural literacy, that's what's unique and makes up a good international school.

The Buzz: What do you like about the IB Curriculum?

Mr.Kotrc: I think it's good because it not only develops skills and knowledge, but it also looks at everything from a global point of view, and it really looks at the development of the individual personality.

The Buzz: A lot of students have been complaining about this year's ECA fee...any comments on that?

Mr.Kotrc: I think the ECA fees seem to be a good compromise between whether one should pay for the personal sports or activities completely yourself or shall the community pay for it, and I think we have found a compromise by saying that 40 percent of the costs come from the individual student/family and 60 percent are still coming out of everybody's budget. I think that if someone represents BBIS on a sports team then the costs are still subsidised.

The Buzz: What are your thoughts on school spirit?

Mr.Kotrc: School spirit is important and I believe everyone should be proud of their school. I do think it would be great to increase school spirit by focusing on the positives and not on the negatives.

#### InnoTrans 2012


The International Trade Fair for Transport Technology, InnoTrans 2012, was held at the Messe Berlin. From 18th to 21st of September 2012, the vehicle manufacturing companies of the world gathered at the largest congress center in Europe to present and promote their newest models of trains.

I visited the fair on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, entering from the south entrance where far extending rails were filled with round-cornered rectangle shapes of first cars of the trains. Colourful and diverse in shapes, the cars were from a variety of companies from different countries, each one showing unique characters in design.

There were public transportation trains and freight trains from well-known corporations such as Daimler-Benz, Staedtler, GE (General Electric), and DB (Deutsche Bahn).

Some of them had especially aesthetic designs, their body covered with flower motifs for example, or unique interiors with the seats covered with line drawings of the city in which the car will drive through.

People were allowed to go in some cars to look at every detail on the inside. Children were fascinated by being able to see the cockpit, and soft seats gave the grand-parents who needed a rest a



chance to relax.

Some other cars were more interactive. In one case visitors could move the lever at the bottom of a freight train to open and close the joints, or the kids could gather around for a driving simulation of a new model of railroad train.

Bicycle Thieves— Your bike is never safe

Your bicycle is no longer safe. As thieves get more and more intelligent, and are equipped with more and more resources that aid their deeds, it gets harder and harder for people like us to keep our possessions safe. A scientific method so startlingly simple is aiding the bicycle thieves. And there is little we can do to stop them.

If you have seen an advertisement for a lock, or, in fact, the back of the packaging of a lock when you bought one, you can see that the supplier tries to tell us how tough it is and how reliable it

is and how reliable it would be to keep your bicycle safe. Unfortunately, there is an extent to how tough, or durable, the material for the lock is and how hard it is. There is an inverse relationship between the two, which is a huge advantage to the thieves as modern technology and resources have not made it much harder to break into a bicycle lock.

Suppose the lock is made of the hardest material on Earth - diamond. This seems a good idea provided the substance is not that expensive. However, it being hard doesn't make it tough. Diamond is brittle, and a few hammers would break the diamond. Replace it with a tough material, like rubber. It would take hours for a potential thief to disintegrate such a lock using a hammer. However, a sharp edged tool such as a chainsaw will do the job. All the more easy for the thieves.

Most of the bicycle locks these days are made of tougher material, not harder material. It might be because materials such as rubber are cheaper than materials that make the lock hard, or it might be just a safety measure. (It is far more noticeable if a thief tries to use a chainsaw to break a lock in comparison to using a hammer!)

To make matters worse, a newer, more efficient, and scientific method has been devised to aid the bicycle thieves. A canned air spray cooled to -25 degrees Celsius coupled with a hammer does the work for the thieves. When the cooled air

is sent through the lock, it becomes surprisingly brittle and so it becomes easier to break using a hammer.

The worst part is that lock manufacturers have found nothing to counter such a method, and the consumers suffer the consequences. The only thing we can do to protect our bikes is to take them home.

#### iPhone 5: Review

The iPhone 5 is the newest device in the iPhone line up. This new iPhone is probably the most different and most changed iPhone since the very first one. The first thing you will notice is that the screen is a lot bigger, it is now a four inch (10.16 cm) screen. For all people who like to watch movies on the iPhone will now have a lot more fun doing this. The new screen is a perfect 16 to 9 (16:9) screen; this means that you will not see black stripes at the top of the video or only a limited section of the movie, as most movies available on iTunes will fit to the screen perfectly.

Something that many people will not like is the new dock connector, it is now a lot smaller and reversible. This means that all the old iPod cables will no longer fit. The new connector called Lightning is a lot smaller, it is only about 0.8 cm wide, has

only 9 pins instead of 30 and can be plugged in both ways. Although the new connector is very cool and only has advantages, it will be a pain to replace all iPhone accessories.

Something that not many people expected is a longer battery life of the iPhone, but now although it has a better CPU (Processor) and a new networking chip, Apple was able to improve the battery life. You are now able to browse the web over wifi for 10 hours and over 3G, Edge or Analog (o) for 8 hours. Because of the new networking chip the iPhone 5 now also supports LTE which is theoretically able to download 100 megabits per second. In Germany sadly it is not supported it many regions, Berlin is covered by the Deutsche Telekom in some areas but very likely other companies like Vodafone and O2 will follow soon.

Just as with the iPhone 4s, there are three options of storage you can choose from one with 16GB, 32GB and 64GB Flash Storage priced at 679€ for 16GB, 789€ for 32GB and 899€ for 64GB. This should be plenty of storage for the normal user but personally I would prefer a thicker iPhone with more storage and a higher quality screen. Apple still has everyone believe that their screen has the highest resolution that is visible for the human eye; it is true up to a point, but if you hold the device closer

Regardless of the direction that Nolan took, the superhero genre (realism), Rises still finds plenty of opportunities to be ridiculous. The stunts and overall co-ordination are great; however, technical proficiency is dwarfed by the superb leading cast.

The true star was
Tom Hardy as Bane. Hardy
took this character to a level
never seen in the history of
Batman; Bane is usually depicted as a mindless bodybuilder who seemed only capable of the word 'SMASH'.
Nolan's Bane was written
perfectly for the kind of ruthless revolutionary that he was.

Bane was a character that carried a vast amount of weight when on camera; he was an unstoppable force which made the victory

President Barack Obama is best known for his controversial health care reforms. Obama promised to "revive the economy; provide affordable, accessible health care to all; strengthen [..] public education and social security systems; define a clear path to energy independence and tackle climate change; end the war in Iraq responsibly and finish our mission in Afghanistan; and work with [US] allies to prevent Iran from developing a nuclear weapon." A more radical politician then his opponent Romney, Obama believes that major change is necessary, "If we think that we can secure our country by just talking tough without acting tough and smart, then we will misunderstand this moment and miss its opportunities. If we think that we can use the same partisan playbook where we just challenge our opponent's patriotism to win an election, then the American people will lose. The times are too serious for this kind of politics."

Obama's victory in 2008 has been the major, and predictable, triumph in his political career. Yet, despite retaining support of large sector of electorate, clearly visible during the campaign, his victory in the current elections is not as certain. The main argument of the opposition is Obama's "inability" to resolve a number

of issues in both internal and foreign politics, starting with the unprecedented economic crisis and ending with the persistent unemployment rate. Obama's major supporters are, however, reluctant to admit this argument, implying that President Bush's administration caused the crisis, and Obama can't deal with it due to Republican opposition in the Congress. Among Obama's most controversial decisions, the most debated is his Health Care policy. All of these factors have certainly reduced the support of the masses. Nevertheless, Obama still remains a strong candidate.

The candidate from the Republican party and former governor of Massachussets Mitt Romney has the image of a cunning and self confident man. His political and personal career can be indubitably described as brilliant. A charismatic leader, he is utterly opposed to any radical change, preferring to think in long time frames. His rating has, however, suffered from accusations and critics, putting to open display his machinations with taxes. AKA "Quarter Billion Man", Mitt Romney has a considerable capital, but having earned 11.2 million US dollars, he has paid only 1.4m US dollars in taxes. Another loud scandal which might have a dramatic effect on the electorate is the publishing of a private tape on which Mitt Romney refers to

Obama's supporters as victims who live off governmental aid. While this is a harsh statement, one must not forget that among Obama's supporters many are unemployed and depend on government support.

Romney's nomination campaign was very cleverly planned. While making few appearances in public, Romney decided to conserve his main agitation towards the end of the campaign. Having suffered a year of persistent criticism, he has rapidly gained popularity, which enabled him to pass the nomination stage with impressive ease.

According to Mark McKinnon, former advisor to President George W. Bush, and 2008 Republican nominee John McCain, Romney has good chances in the upcoming presidential race: "Romney is playing things very methodically and deliberately. I think he understands the physics of this game very well now and is carefully calibrating his approach to 2012."

I believe that America needs a strong and appropriate president, more so in the light of the current crises, both internal and external. The main question is, whose policies will be

suited in today's political context. Being a conservative, I feel empathy for Mitt Romney.
