

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
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
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What is your best memory from the years that you have worked at BBIS?

Since when have you been working at BBIS? What campuses did you experience?on trips as a whole grade?

Mr. Johannsen: I have been working at BBIS since 2002 – 1 year as a substitute, and then I became a Drama and English teacher in 2003. I have only been on this campus...but that was when it was entirely Haus 2, except for the 2nd floor of Haus 3.

Mrs. Klooster: I have been working since August 2005 at BBIS. At this stage the whole school occupied only House 2 with about 350 students. We had three laboratories and 4 Science teachers. BBIS has certainly grown since then.

Ms. Roy: I have worked at BBIS since August 2003 and have only had the chance to work on the Seeberg campus. However this campus has changed a great deal since I arrived. When I came the elementary school had early childhood through Grade 4 all in House 2 in one hallway! We still had Grade 6 in the elementary school too.

$What is the {\it biggest change that you have witnessed at BBIS} over time?$

Mr. J: The growth, renovation, renewal...every year or so, a new building or play space... And male teachers taking paternity leave!

Mrs. Klooster: The biggest change at BBIS was the transformation of the area where now the sports field is located; then it housed an old and dilapidated swimming pool, surrounded by trees and plants. The construction of the sport facilities (including the gym) was raising BBIS onto a new level.

Ms. Roy: There are so many changes that have happened at BBIS. First of all we have just grown so much over the years. I remember when I heard that we would be starting a boarding school and I wasn't sure what I thought about that. Now I appreciate so much the boarding students who are at the sporting events and the performing arts events and bringing so many different perspectives to our community. But probably the biggest change has been this year with the elementary school becoming the primary school and moving to house 1. We have been working so hard to get everything ready and it is an exciting time in the primary school for new learning spaces and new ideas.

What is your favorite thing at BBIS? What makes BBIS unique?

Mr. J: The Drama Club, but can you blame me for choosing it? It goes hand in hand with what makes us unique and my favorite memories. Agreed, there are other schools with bigger and more sophisticated Drama programs. Still, it is our "Good Stuff" that sets us apart. Chiara Heppner, class of 2013, said it best when she joined the school. She played a small dancing role in the company of Man of La Mancha back in 2010. During "Good Stuff," she commented on the event (having never seen it before) – "I came from a school with a much bigger Drama program, but we never had something like this where we all come together before the final show to talk about what we value in each other." For anyone who has experienced a full Musical Mania week, you can't help but bask in the theatrical endorphins – students and teachers alike. Rent, Bang Bang, You're Dead, The Diary of Anne Frank, Cabaret, Joseph, Milkshakes, Streetcar, Crying Wolf – once you become part of the Drama Club, something inherently good remains with you. Such unifying moments as graduates returning to BBIS to be in the "Graduate Show," a "Cha Cha Slide" finale at Romeo & Juliet with previous R & J casts, or the newest presentation of Thespian Honor Society plaques that have members all the way back to the Class of 2005 helped make BBIS the glorious school it has become as well as what it is becoming.

Mrs. Klooster: There are so many positive aspects to BBIS, it is difficult to pin point one item only. Certainly special for me is the ease and mutual respect with which pupils and staff interact. We can all work in a supportive environment to follow the holistic educational approach at BBIS. Unique to BBIS is also the history of the campus – it certainly left an impression on me when I visited BBIS for the first time at the very beginning of January 2005, during my summer vacation from Australia.

Genetically Manipulated Food in Germany

The most consumed good worldwide, unequally divided amongst the rich and poor. The resource that is limited by the agricultural terrains of the planet. It is our vital source of energy: food.

Everyone needs food in order to survive, but as population increases in some parts of the world, supplying food is becoming more challenging. One of our options to increase this supply is by using genetically modified crops. "Genetically modified" is reminiscent of "Frankenstein"-plants, but in Germany, and most of Europe, it is almost impossible to not be around genetically modified consumables.

The SPD in Germany currently states that: "The SPD Bundestagsfraktion wants..., that the cultivation of genetically modified plants can be generally and nationwide prohibited, therefore creating a healthy environment and GM-free acres on German ground." A GM-free Germany can only exist if Europe cut down on their massive imports from North and South

America of genetically modified animal food. 35 million tons of soy beans are annually being imported into the EU to cover our immense meat and milk demand. That is approximately 65 kilograms per EU citizen. According to recent studies, more than 80% of soy beans are genetically modified.

GMOs have positive and negative aspects to them. On one hand, the engineered DNA can provide an enhanced or reduced taste / spice, it can provide more nutrition by adding minerals and vitamins, and gene-modified crops are more resistant to diseases. Plus, less chemicals and fertilizers have to be used to grow the plants, thus not harming the environment. On the other hand GMOs cause environmental damage due to the change that occurs when cross-breeding with other plants. GMOs take just as long to grow as regular crops do with fertilizer, meaning they are as time efficient, Lastly studies have shown that "consumptions of GMO food increases the risks of

allergies in a general population". According to the Institute for Responsible Technology, GM crops are not as precisely manipulated as genetic engineers claim they are. "Native genes can be mutated, deleted, permanently turned on or off, and hundreds may change their levels of protein expression. This collateral damage may result in increasing the levels of an existing allergen, or even producing a completely new, unknown allergen within the crop" (2007). Furthermore, if an allergy has been developed for crops also used as animal food, like soy, then the risk of showing allergic reactions to the meat that had once been an animal feeding on this crop is also high.

In Germany, the "Bio" label is very common. The consumer

can assure himself that the product labelled with "Bio" was made only with natural ingredients and processes. That includes the fodder for a cow, if the label is found on a sealed steak. The "Bio" label enables the consumer to decide: "Should I pay more for better quality or pay less for the standard quality?"

The three letters make it fairly easy for the customer to decide whether or not he wants to buy a "bio" product. So shouldn't also gene-manipulated goods be labelled as well? The European threshold value for labelling GM food starts at 0.9% of all ingredients, although there is no scientific reasoning for it. Does 0.8% to 0.9% make a great difference? All products should be marked if they were in contact with

any gene-manipulated material. That would recolour every grocery store in Germany, GM labels on medicine and our clothing. Even the Euro bill with which you pay at the check-out, is made from genetically modified cotton wool. In reality, the dream of a life without GMO is seemingly impossible.

The argument of the SPD policy document is pointless, due to the fact that Germany and the rest of Europe relies on genetically manipulated goods. In this age of "Genome-Editing" technologies, it becomes harder to distinguish between natural genotype change and a forced genotype change. How can we regulate the use of genetically manipulated goods, if we cannot verify the origin of the genotype?

The Battle of the Primaries

> AS THE US ELECTIONS progress and edge closer to November 8th, 2016, the set presidential election date, candidates for POTUS scramble to gain the affection of the public. The most recent polls have identified Hillary Clinton as the frontrunner of the Democrats, 25.5 points ahead of Bernie Sanders, and Donald Trump as the frontrunner of the GOP, 14.3 points ahead of Ben Carson. These two primaries in the race have been under scrutiny by the public, as well as the media. Clinton has been the subject of criticism regarding the use of her

federal email account. During her time as Secretary of State, Clinton is said to have sent private emails through the email address issued to her by the government. Even though her numbers have decreased slightly due to the rise of new candidates and the email "scandals", Clinton is still 6 points ahead of Trump, thus still leading the overall polls. Donald Trump, whose candidacy was interpreted as a joke by many for the first month, continues to lead the GOP polls, with numbers that increase exponentially every month.

When matched against one another, Clinton and Trump's polls result in the largest gender gap in the race. Women tend to break for Clinton by 23 points, 60% to 37%, while men favor Trump by 11 points, 53% to 42%. Yet as Jeb Bush, Donald Trump, Bernie Sanders and other strong candidates gain popularity, the gap between these presidential contenders and Clinton narrows. New polls propose that in order for Clinton to regain her vast lead over the other candidates, Joe Biden, another Democrat candidate, who has been the Vice President to Barack Obarna from 2008, would not make a run for president. As this race is still in its early stages, contenders still have the opportunity to rethink their candidacy.

Important debates to look out for are the Republican Debate on September 16th on CNN, as well as the Democratic Debate on October 13th on CNN as well. The General Debate date will be announced early 2016. AN UPDATE ON THE GRUELINGLY PER-PETUAL REFUGEE CRISIS

et another row deaths: another series of incidents; another escalation in the ceaseless dilemma that is the global refugee crisis. The last few weeks have once again reflected the absence of progress made in this dire humanitarian calamity. One can only feel a sense of 'Déjà vu, witnessing the latest incidents, devoured by the media. Sunken boat disasters, just a few miles off the EU shores, deluged campsites, and hundreds, even thousands of deaths. All with the exception of one anomaly; this time,

a single photograph left the STEINHORST world astonished.

A young, three year old boy, lying facedown in the spume washed up at the beach. He was one of 12 Syrian refugees that drowned in an attempt to take the perilous journey from Turkey, across the Mediterranean into Greece. The innocent body lying limpless on the Turkish shore, only too well encapsulates the inordinate risks refugees are willing to take, to reach the EU. In the summer of 2015 alone, an estimated 2,500 people have died, attempting to cross the Mediterranean Sea. Within

hours of its publication on the Internet, the photograph took social media by storm; a powerful message, reiterating the gravity of this issue. As Justin Forsyth, CEO of Save the Children, beseeched a recent interview with The Guardian: "This tragic image of a little boy who's lost his life fleeing Syria is shocking and is a reminder of the dangers children and families are taking in search of a better life. This child's plight should concentrate minds and force the EU to come together and agree to a plan to tackle the refugee crisis."

Meanwhile in mainland Europe, recent events caused unusual levels of disunity between the two EU governments of Budapest and Berlin.

With the train transit of vast numbers of refugees from the east, to the desired heart of the EU, Hungary was faced with a logistical disaster. By Wednesday of last week, the number of refugees swelled to a massive 3,000, effecting tensions between the passengers and the authorities. The crowds were left stranded in the Hungarian capital, largely placed into temporary camps, and reportedly left without sufficient amounts of food and water. The refugees, mostly carrying legitimate tickets with the destination Austria. were disallowed to continue their journey, due to a decision made by the Hungarian Railways in cohesion with the national government: In the interests of rail travel security the company has decided that until further notice, direct train services from Budapest to western Europe will not be in service." Hungarian Prime Minister, Viktor Oban, blamed "Europe's biggest influx of migrants since the end of World War 2" on Germany "opening their doors too wide," In a statement released on Thursday last week, German chancellor Angela Merkel rebuffed these comments stating, "Germany is doing what is morally and legally required of [them], no more and no less."

Thus, the battle on all frontiers is set to continue. As the humanitarian crisis is intensifying by the day, European and trans-national politics have yet again failed to find the slightest indication of a solution. As we edge closer to the end of the calendar year, things are looking ever-so unnerving for the European Union and their war on the global refugee crisis.

abe Newell is probably a name you should have heard of by now. He is the owner of the digital game distribution platform "Steam" and the head of valve, a company that has received many awards for its game design. Interestingly enough, the internet has revered Gabe for his innovations in the pc gaming market and his approach to running his company. This admiration has gone to the extent of people (jokingly) referring to him as "lord Gaben" (originating from his online username: GabeN). Prior to founding Valve, Gabe worked at Microsoft for 13 years. To put it in his own words he was the ""producer on the first three releases of Windows". After a Microsoft Employee, Michael Abrash, left to make a game called quake Newell became inspired and left with another Microsoft employee named Mike Harrington to found valve.


With a net worth of over 1.25 billion dollars Gabe Newell has become one of the most known figureheads of the computer and video games community. "Steam sales" are massive sales hosted on his online game distribution service named Steam. These sales were becoming so popular that Microsoft and Sony had to come with services to compete with the steam sales. Microsoft introduced the "Free games with gold" policy and Sony introduced "sales and free games with Playstation plus".

Gabe has shown his knowledge of the gaming community on multiple occasions. For instance, he hired the mod developer "IceFrog", who created modifications and mini games for a game named Warcraft III, to create a full game based off one of his "Mods" named Dota. Dota 2 is now one of the most popular competitive games on pc, along with Counter Strike: GO (also owned by valve), League of Legends and StarCraft 2. This knowledge of games is also shown in many of the games he helped developed or supervised, such as Haiflife 2, a game in desperate need for a sequel.

REMEMBERING THE PAST

HE MATTER PRESENTED BELOW, IS SOMETHING THAT HAS BEEN LARGELY FORGOTTEN, ALTHOUGH IN THE SPECTRUM OF HUMANITY, MAY HAVE BEEN ONE OF THE WORST PREVENTABLE CATACLYSMIC CATASTROPHES OF THE 20TH CENTURY.



s of 14/09/2015 it has been 29 years, 4 months, and 20 days since the reactor number 4 of the V.I. Lenin Nuclear Power Station in the Ukrainian city of Pripyat (then known as Ukrainian SSR), experienced a beyond-design-basis accident. Many may have already forgotten what actually occurred on the night of 26, of April 1986 and the events that followed: therefore in short, at 1:24:04 a.m. an experiment was conducted to test a theoretical emergency cooling system on reactor number 4, in the event of a power grid failure. In the event of such a failure 4 backup diesel generators would provide the energy required to power the cooling systems to prevent the core from melting; the test was conducted because between the grid failure and the backup generators kicking in there was a delay period of around 60-75 seconds, which was deemed

unsafe by Russian authorities. In Layman's terms, physicists predicted that one could use the excess heat produced by the decaying nuclear fission material to power the cooling system. To test this, the experiment required that graphite tipped boron control rods (responsible for controlling the fission reaction) be removed from the core; this being one of the largest flaws on the fateful night. After a long series of malpractice, lack of safety procedures, and miscommunication, the experiment went monumentally wrong. As a result of these strings of smaller safety mishaps in the previous shifts, the experiment failed, the temperature and pressure of the core went critical. The engineers on duty instinctively pressed the AZ-5, or SCRAM button, which causes all control rods to be inserted back into the core. This process of emergency discontinuation took around 7 minutes for the Chemobyl reactor. However within about a minute of the experiment starting enough pressure from the cooling system had built up to burst the 2000 metric ton reactor cap into the air. The explosion violently caused coolant to flood the reactor core, causing a second explosion roughly 2 seconds after the initial blast. It is estimated that the secondary explosion had the equivalent force of 10 tons of TNT. The stations fire fighters attempted to put the fires out, however to no avail. No matter how much water they put onto the reactor, the core kept burning.

Now that an abridged version of the story is known, it is important to understand the implications of such an event: currently there is a 30 km exclusion zone that will be uninhabitable for the next 20 thousand years. However things at Chernobyl could have gotten a lot worse: only 20 years after the incident, where the real files that are hidden in the vaults of Kremlin were released. 4 Floors under





reactor number 4 was a failsafe bubbler pool, which was essentially a large reservoir of water used to cool steam in the event of a broken pipeline. Above this pool were 195 tons of molten reactor components, such as graphite and fuel rods, which were melting through the core casing and onto the concrete above the bubbler pool, creating corium. The Russian scientist Vassili Nesterenko, who was the leading scientist on the countries thermonuclear ballistic missile program, stated that if only 1.4 tons of this uranium corium mixture made contact with the pool it would have sufficed to set off an explosion comparable to a large nuclear bomb, Nesterenko and his team of scientists predicted that the explosion would have a yield of around 3 to 5 megatons of TNT. In this scenario, almost the entirety of Europe would be severely contaminated with radiation and rendered uninhabitable. Within the first hour of this explosion more than 10 Thousand people would have died, within 2 years millions of people would have died from acute radiation poisoning. Over 2 days a battalion of 80



helicopters dropped more than 2400 tons of lead onto the reactor trying to cool the reactor and prevent the corium mixture from reaching the pool, 600 pilots died in the months following the operation.

The bubbler pool was drained by three engineers who manually opened flood gates that released the water, by diving to a submerged latch. Alexei Ananenko, Valeri Bezpalov and Boris Baranov, when remerging from the water already showed signs of acute radiation sickness. Within a few days of exposure, two of the divers died, the others following only a few weeks later.

In the entire process more than 500 thousand people and the equivalent of 18 billion dollars were spent in the fight against the invisible enemy. Every resource required in the clean-up was mobilised, thousands of men and women put themselves at risk of death to stop further radioactive contamination, the nameless heroes of Chernobyl, countless numbers of which are already dead. The effects of radiation on "Liquidators" (those that worked in the clean-up of Chernobyl) are still present; the radiation has taken its toll on their bodies, of the 500 thousand, 20 thousand are already dead, another 20 thousand are listed ass disabled: the effects are devastating. The liquidators prevented the disaster from escalating because of the selfless acts, like those that exposed themselves to lethal amounts of radiation. Next year on the 26th of April, 30 years will have passed since the horrific events that occurred at the Chernobyl power plant, and therefore it is our obligation to honour those that sacrificed so much, many of which were unaware of the mortal danger they were putting themselves in, not only at the anniversary, but also now.

On a closing note is important to express that many mistakes were made, both before and after the incident, that have and will, claim the lives of many people. The purpose of this was not to scare people away from nuclear energy, simply to remind the public of the momentous events in human history that have been so easily forgotten, and Chernobyl is remembered as a place of significance, a place of great morning, grief, and above all, achievement in the harshest of times. The importance of which should never be forgotten.

COULD YOU START OFF WITH INTRODUCING YOURSELF?

INTRODUCING YOURSELF?

I am originally from Brighton in the UK. I studied Biochemistry at Manchester University (also in the UK) and Education at the University of Sussex.

Following this I travelled to Australia where I have family who live in Melbourne, stopping off for a month in Malaysia on the way. I lived in Melbourne for a year enjoying the climate, and having a summer birthday for the first time in my life (my birthday is in mid December so it is always cold and dreary). I moved back to the UK and worked as a science teacher, firstly in Brighton (I had a sea view from my lab which was great), then for 3 years at a school just outside of London (with a view of a landfill site - not so great). Hazy, mellow and laid back. Those are the words I would use to describe this album. This album. creatively named 2, features 11 songs. All of the songs in this album feature 2 guitars, 1 bass guitar and a drum. Mac's distinct style is present throughout the entire album. 

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
nfamous for its exclusive and severe selection process, the most renowned night club is of course Berghain. Not only has the venue been visited by countless world-leading DJs, but also promotes partying into the morning hours with many of the 1500 guests not leaving until 13:00.

Although Berlin may be a melting pot of restaurants and clubs for weekend nights, it appears that many of us still find ourselves lost in a mental turmoil of where to go on a Saturday night. Barriers such as guest lists and age restrictions leave those among the younger generations overlooked with cinemas being the only option for a social evening with friends. However, few people seem to know of the

Clärchen's Ballhaus. Located on Augutstrasse 24, in the Mitte nighbourhood centre, the Ballhaus is primarily a restaurant with traditional German cuisine. While this may sound mundane and highly unimaginative at first, the locale's subsidiary offer is dancing.

The Clärchen's Ballhaus was established during the DDR era and was a place where many officials spent their weekends. Despite the few renovations, the restaurant/club remains stuck in the past: silver plastic tassels dominate the walls, blue neon lights and and a spinning disco ball authenticate the 80s-club atmosphere the Ballhaus says to have preserved over the years, reluctant to acclimatize itself to the contemporary club design.

Accompanying this is of course music corresponding to the 80s atmosphere painted by the venue's appearance. Nowadays, most clubs prefer to play loud, uninspiring pop and house music, all of which seem to follow the same four chords. Being a time machine back the past, Clärchen's Ballhaus almost solely plays 20th Century music, whether it be Sinatra-esque jazz, Aretha Franklin's anthems or Bronski Beat's staple hits. Furthermore, in order to suit every music-palette, the locale has an on-going music event schedule: whilst Saturday nights are devoted to a DJ

soul band after 23:00 o'clock, the rest of the week includes other genres such as salsa Argentinian tango and swing dance.

Aside from the exquisite traditional German food (eg. spätzle and schnitzel) and music selection, the most notable characteristic of the Ballhaus is the variety of guest-type. The club appears to attract people across the whole age spectrum, most likely due to its effortless positive atmosphere.

The Clärchen's Ballhaus has an entrance fee of 5€ in regard to its high demand and is most

undoubtedly an exceptional alternative from the generic 21st-century club found now-adays. If you are looking for a night with a unique setting and one-of-a-kind experience, the Ballhaus is the perfect fit.

AN INTERVIEW WITH MR. GREGORY

WORLD SCOUT MOVEMENT

A JOURNALIST FROM THE PAW PRINT INTERVIEW MR. GREGORY, THE SCHOOL COUNSELLOR, ABOUT BOY SCOUTS, ITS HISTORY AND WHAT BEING A SCOUT ENTAILS

hat do you think about Scouts?
Scouting is amazing! Scouts gave me a huge opportunity when I was younger, to explore the world, adventure and I gained valuable experience in woodcraft, camping, mountaineering, leadership and personal growth. I met some of my life friends through Scouting, boys whom I am still lifelong friends with, all of whom I met when I was a Cub Scout when I was eight years old.

How has scouting changed since you were a Scout? I am actually still involved as a Leader Trainer in Scouting as part of British Scouts Overseas, but beyond the uniform changing and girls joining in the 1990's, I think Scouting has remained true to its

origins, even going back to 1907 when Baden-Powell founded it. Scouts still explore and truly adventure and not much has changed since. That is what makes it relevant and attractive to many children and young people and why it is the largest youth movement in the world with over 40 million members from 160 countries.

Do you think badges and the programme have changed?

Yes, some new badges have been introduced like IT Specialist, Gamer, Web Designer etc., some badge titles have been tweaked, but at its core are the same principles.

How did the fleur-de-lis become the Scout Symbol? The fleur-de-lis is the main element in the logo of most Scouting organizations. The symbol was first used by Sir Robert Baden-Powell as an arm-badge for soldiers who qualified as scouts (reconnaissance specialists) in the 5th Dragoon Guards, which he commanded at the end of the 19th century; it was later used in cavalry regiments throughout the British Army until 1921. In 1907, Baden-Powell made brass fleur-de-lis badges for the boys attending his first experimental "Boy Scout" camp at Brown Sea Island. In his book Scouting for Boys, Baden-Powell referred to the motif as "the arrowhead which shows the North on a map or a compass" and continued; "It is the Badge of the Scout because it points in the right direction and upward... The three points remind you of the three points of the Scout Promise", being duty to God and country, helping others and keeping the Scout Law. The World Scout Emblem of the Scout Movement has elements which are used by most national Scout organizations. The stars stand for truth and knowledge, the encircling rope for unity, and its reef knot or square knot, service.

Why should people join Scouts?

I think that Scouting has a considerable amount to offer to young people. Employers and Universities see Scouting as a valuable set of skills that lend themselves

to highly effective employers and future managers and leaders. Scouting offers some of the finest Leadership Training in the World. Companies like IBM and Apple often use Gilwell Park as a centre for Leadership Training. I would not have had the chance to experience real adventure without my Scouting experiences, at such a young age. Whether climbing a frozen waterfall in the Scottish Highlands or spending 3 days climbing the Matter-


horn with an international team of 19-25 years old, these experiences stay with you and form and shape you as a person and a leader. At its heart Scouting has a set of values and beliefs which in 2015 are just as relevant today and still guide my work and the way I live even after 32 years since joining. I don't think I would be doing the job that I am doing now if it were not for Scouting.
